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## EDITORIAL

The three papers in this Issue all concern risk management. The first demonstrates how research on risk management is centered on the security of information. The second and third papers both examine the security concern regarding behavioral aspects, focusing on intentional information disorder and the unintentional disclosure of sensitive information.

The first paper, entitled "Are we ready to manage digital risks today and tomorrow?", is by Raymond Bierens and Abbas Shahim from the Netherlands. It analyses, through a systematic literature review, the way in which the existing state of the art literature deals with digital risks, as little scientific research exists on digital risk regarding the holistic management of risks triggered by the dynamically changing technological systems within an organisation, as well as the many external dependencies create by each of these systems. The analysis shows that research on risk management is predominantly centred on the security of information.

In the second paper, "How moral intensity affects information disorder behavior on social media", the author, Wei Xie, from the USA, investigates information disorder behaviors, such as misinformation, disinformation, and malinformation on social media, using Jones' Moral Intensity lens. The study provides valuable insights into understanding the complexity of online ethical behavior, which has become increasingly relevant in today's digital age, particularly in the context of information disorder behavior on social media.

The third paper is entitled "Sharing confidential information and privacy calculus", and is by Joti Kaur and Simran Dhillon, who are also from the USA. It examines how the act of disclosing sensitive information such as location, finances, and health on social media platforms can result in serious repercussions for users. This study aims to explore users' inclination to share confidential information by utilizing the concepts of privacy calculus and prospect theory.
